

## Step Back in Time at the Pontiac Transportation Museum

f you're looking for a fascinating way to spend an hour or two, consider a visit to the **Pontiac Transportation**Museum, located at 250 W. Pike Street in Pontiac. This museum tells the story of the city's deep-rooted automotive history—far beyond just the Pontiac brand.

An informative short film and a variety of vehicles on display guide you from the carriage era through the evolution of Oakland cars, Rapid trucks, the iconic GTO, and more. You'll even discover

why the Pontiac pictured here features "suicide doors' and was once a favorite among gangsters.



Did you know? At one time, Pontiac's Bus and Coach Plant produced 95% of the buses used across the United States, and General Motors' massive local facility once employed over 25,000

people. The city was truly a hub of American automotive innovation.

The museum is barrier-free,



offers on-site parking, and is open Thursday through Sunday. It has recently expanded into a second phase, allowing even more historic vehicles to be displayed. Admission for seniors is \$12, and guided tours are available for those who want a deeper dive into the exhibits.



Don't miss the **small gift shop**, which includes some unique and nostalgic displays.

After our visit, we capped off the

experience with a delicious lunch just a few blocks away at the **M-1 Grill**—a great way to round out your visit.

#### If you're still using Windows 10

Check your inbox. Microsoft's reminding you to upgrade to Windows 11 before **security support ends on Oct. 14**. They'll tell you if your computer can update or if you need a new one. If you don't take action you're leaving the door wide open for hackers.

Microsoft is killing off windows 10 in October. It's wise to upgrade.

#### Leave your printer on



Turning off your printer can trigger maintenance tasks when you turn it back on, which sucks up expensive

ink. Instead, let your printer go into energy-saving mode when it's not in use.

#### Windows is getting AI agents

Microsoft just announced a new feature that lets you change computer settings just by asking. In Settings, you can type stuff like "my text is too small" or "control my PC with voice," and the AI will handle it. No more digging through menus. It's coming to Copilot+ PCs first, with more devices to follow.

#### 3-second tech genius

Track a flight instantly by typing the flight number into Google (like Delta 123) to see the live status and arrival time.

#### Lock it away

Your most private notes can be locked behind a face or fingerprint scan in the Notes app on your iPhone. With a note open, tap the three dots at the top right and then **Lock**.

#### **Oh Brother**

The printer manufacturer quietly pushed a firmware update that blocks third-party ink cartridges. It gets worse. They scrubbed older firmware versions from their support site, so there's no way to roll back. If you haven't updated, keep your device offline and reject firmware updates.

## Junk texts are downright annoying

You can block them, and stick it to the scammers

Report texts to the GSMA's Reporting Service with just a few clicks. Forward the message to 7726 (guess what that spells?) or just hit "Report junk" in your messaging app.

### Are you selling or turning in your vehicle?



It's up to you to delete your data. If you're using your car's connected app on your phone, that's a good place to start. In the settings, look for options to wipe your

account. Then download this app:

Privacy4Cars is a free iOS and Android app. With it, you can wipe out your phone book, call logs, text messages, navigation history, home address, garage door codes, passwords, biometrics and vehicle credentials.
